Solar Eclipse: Eye Protection Tips

Millions of Americans nationwide will be able to view the solar eclipse on August 21, making eye safety critically important."

It is unsafe for anyone to look directly at the sun at any time or during a solar eclipse, other than if you are located in the "path of totality" during the brief total phase of the eclipse.

Use approved solar eclipse glasses and avoid fake viewers that are being sold. Read and follow any instructions packaged with or printed on the glasses.

Do not look at the sun through a camera, a telescope, binoculars, or any other optical device while using your eclipse glasses, as the concentrated solar

your eclipse glasses, as the concentrated solar rays can damage the filter, enter your eyes and cause serious injury. should be removed only once the moon completely blocks the sun. Once the sun reappears, glasses should be replaced.
